



Our former President **Frank Ruzzo, Jr.** will present a talk entitled "The Homer Laughlin China Company," the history of the world's largest pottery company. The

presentation will highlight the company's products from its inception in 1877 until today. Some of the highlights will be the story of Fiesta, a depression era design which has endured from 1936 to 2010.



Frank will use his personal collection to illustrate some of the company's most important lines including Laughlin Art China, White Ironstone, Yellowware, and the color lines including Fiesta, Harlequin, Riviera, Wells Art, Tango and Rhythm.

The company, located in Newell, West Virginia, continues to operate today producing restaurant lines and Fiesta for modern tabletops, Join us for "China Night" at the Wissahickon Valley Historical Society.

Greet friends and check out new displays at the Schoolhouse - including our rehabilitated stained glass window. The meeting will begin promptly at 7:30 p.m.

On May 14 the Society will host an open House at the 1895 Schoolhouse to celebrate the building's designation to the National Registry of Historic Buildings. The new roof, chimney, and paint have the outside of the building looking great. Now the inside needs a good cleaning. 14th. Most jobs will take an hour or so - and can be completed on a Thursday morning or at a time to be arranged - perhaps a Saturday morning work party.



Jobs available: vacuuming floors (we do have a new vacuum), cleaning woodwork, dusting furniture and bookcases, cleaning display cases, washing windows, cleaning kitchen, cleaning lavatory, and tidying lawn and porch.

WWII "Traveling" Exhibit

An exhibit of artifacts from our collection relating to WWII spent the month of March at the Blue Bell Library and is now located in the second floor museum at the 1895 Schoolhouse. The exhibit was assembled by **Emmy Simon, Jeffrey Hahn, and Peg Johnston** using items donated and loaned by **Joe Schneider, Emmy Simon, Art Driedger, Jeffrey Hahn, and the Dettweiler family.**

The exhibit includes several letters home from soldiers stationed in Europe as well as political cartoons of the era as well as items from the front and home front.

Our second floor museum also features exhibits about Lower Gwynedd, Ambler, and Whitpain as well as items from home and work life of the past. Please visit on a meeting evening, Thursday morning, or during a Sunday open house.

Oak Lane Day School/Cadwalader Estate

Rich History - Future Uncertain

The historic Oak Lane Day School announced last fall that it would close at the end of the 2009-2010 school year. Its property at 137 Stenton was sold and its future is uncertain. The school and property have interesting histories.

The school was established in Cheltenham in 1916 by a group of parents and educators who supported the Progressive Education movement. The movement was a reaction to the Industrial Revolution which was asking schools to prepare workers for industry rather than with a liberal arts education. Originally a coed school for kindergarten through high school, it was first affiliated with the University of Pennsylvania. In the 1930's it was acquired by Temple University as part of their teacher training program. There was always a strong emphasis on art, music, and drama.

In 1960 the school incorporated as an independent school, and in the 1980's it narrowed its focus to the elementary level.

As an independent school, it moved its campus to the former **Cadwalader** estate at the corner of Butler Pike and Stenton Avenue. The estate had been in the Cadwalader family since colonial times and includes a stream, pond, and several specimen trees as well as farm buildings. The school used the original estate building as well as adding a classroom building and a gymnasium.

The land was sold last fall to an affiliate of Hansen Properties. The Whitpain Board of Supervisors recently revised the township's zoning map to change the site from "Institutional" to "R-5 Agricultural/Rural Residential District". That, with a deed restriction of limiting development to 1 building per 2 acres, could potentially allow the construction of 15 houses on the site.
