Our Speakers' Series Continues on Monday, Oct 14, 7 PM, at the WVHS School: WVHS welcomes Dana Dorsey, Executive Director of the Highlands Garden and Mansion, who will present on the mansion's history and its current role. Its website describes The Highlands Mansion and Gardens, dating from 1796, as "44-acres with a late 18th-century Georgian mansion and two-acre formal garden. Surrounded by massive stone walls, the gardens offer a beautiful example of early 20th-century estate-gardening with an unusual blend of horticulture and architecture. The site features nine outbuildings, including a bank barn, springhouse, greenhouse, smokehouse and Gothic Revival gardener's cottage."

Two WVHS Open House Events Are Scheduled for the Fall Season. Both of our museums are listed in the National Register of Historic Places (Volunteers are needed for both):

Sunday, Oct 20, 1-3 PM, 1895 Open House, "Remembering the 1960s":

See the historical society's best examples of the 1960s, from ephemera to a private collection about NASA space exploration, to a recent donation to the society—a large collection of magazines and newspapers about the

Kennedy family and the Kennedy assassination. "Remembering the 1960s," has been assembled to highlight artifacts and documents recently donated along with artifacts from the WVHS collection and from private collectors. Centre Square's vintage fire truck will be there, too!

Sunday, Nov 3, 1-3 PM, Franklinville School Open House: "Back to School in the 1800s." Ever wonder what it was like to attend school before the American Civil War? Continued renovation projects by the Wissahickon Valley Historical Society to the historic Franklinville School have provided the community with the only one-room schoolhouse in the region that is open to the public. Once an early 20th-century gathering space for community picnics and sometimes thousands of guests, the Franklinville Schoolhouse was first utilized in 1858, originally part of Whitpain School District. The school was bought by The Strassburgers, owners of today's Normandy Farm, who saved the school through a purchase in 1916 and added a movie projection room in the rear of the structure in the 1930s. The Franklinville School is listed in the National Registry of Historic Places. The address is 1701 Morris Road, Blue Bell, PA. (Submitted by Michael Leibrandt, lightmedia)

September Speaker Informs and Entertains: Jim Rubillo, a retired educator and officer at Old York Road Historical Society, spoke on "Little Known Revolutionary War Naval Encounters: Philadelphia to Cape May." His presentation examined three battles, often overlooked by history

classes, between the British Navy and Colonial Forces: the Battle of Turtle Gut, the Siege of Fort Mifflin, and the Battle of Cape May. He explained that the Colonies had no navy, so they commissioned privateers to protect the coast. In most cases, the sailors were pirates who backed the ideals of the Revolution, but also made a profit by selling "stray" cargo. Although outgunned, these Colonial forces used trickery and persistence to win battles. After his amusing narrative, he concluded that both the pirates and General Washington were successful in defeating the British because the Patriots pestered and demoralized their opponent.

New Whitpain Township Manager Attends September Meeting: As WVHS guests offered a hearty welcome, Eric Traub, Whitpain Township's new manager, introduced himself to WVHS. He summarized his career, noting that he had been the financial officer for Lower Merion Township before coming to Whitpain. Originally from New York, he holds a master's degree in public administration and, important for WVHS, a bachelor's degree in history. The 1895 School is owned by the township, and in years past, WVHS held a little ceremony to pay the required one-dollar rent. This ritual was "lost" during the pandemic but revived this year because it's not every year we have a new manager. Prior to taking Traub on a brief tour of the building, President Carol Kalos presented Traub with a framed dollar bill. A portion of the certificate appears here:
